Harmful Exotic Species

Minnesota waters are threatened by several exotic species that can be spread unknowingly by anglers and boaters. The following list describes some problem species that have been discovered in Minnesota waters and suggests what you can do to prevent them from spreading to additional lakes and rivers.

Carp, River Ruffe, Grass Carp, and White Perch- These four species can harm game fish populations, desirable plant growth, and the water quality in certain lakes. It is difficult if not impossible to control these species once they enter a watershed.

Relative newcomers to Minnesota, the river ruffe and white perch have been found in the St. Louis River. It is illegal to transport or possess either of these two species of grass carp.

Eurasian Watermilfoil- This aquatic plant has been found in more than 40 Minnesota lakes. It forms dense mats of vegetation that crowd out native aquatic plants and clog propellers. An incredibly fast grower, Eurasian watermilfoil can sprout from plant fragments that cling to a boat, trailer, motor, anchor, or livewell. Just a small fragment can be enough to begin a lake infestation. It is illegal to transport any watermilfoil, Eurasian or northern, over a public road.

Zebra Mussel- These small European mussels were transported to the Great Lakes in ballast tanks of ocean-going ships. In the Great Lakes, zebra mussel colonies have clogged municipal water intake lines, covered boat hulls, fouled beaches, and disrupted lake ecosystems.

Zebra mussels have been discovered in Duluth-Superior Harbor and the Mississippi River, and could spread to inland lakes. Because zebra mussel larvae are too small to see, they can accidently be transported in bilge water, livewells, or other water from the Duluth-Superior Harbor, St. Louis River, Lake Superior, or Mississippi River.

Spiny Water Flea ("BC")- In Minnesota, these tiny zoo plankton are so far only in Lake Superior and in Island Lake, north of Duluth. Spiny water fleas collect on fishing lines and downrigger cables. Like Zebra mussels, spiny water fleas can be transported in water and it only takes one adult or egg to Continued on next page

Stop The Spread- Anglers can keep these exotic species from spreading to other waters by: Cleaning all vegetation off your boat, trailer and equipment; Draining your livewell, bait containers, and engine cooling system after fishing; removing any zebra mussels from your boat hull; not dumping any live fish into any waters; and cleaning and drying your equipment before relaunching.


