FISHING LICENSE HOLDERS DECLINE

The number of licensed anglers fell slightly during 1993 according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) compilation of certified license holders reported by states. Expenditures for licenses, tags, and other permits rose moderately last year. The USFWS reported that 30.2 million anglers purchased licenses during 1993, compared with 30.6 million in 1992.



Anglers bought more types of licenses, however. The total number of licenses, tags, permits and stamps bought by anglers rose to 38.1 million in 1993 from 37.4 million in 1992. To make these purchases, anglers spent \$412.1 million in 1993, compared with \$398.5 in 1992.

Over the past 10 years, the number of license holders nationally has increased only by about four percent. However, many states have experienced relatively large losses or gains in license holders over the same period. For example, increases in Alaska, Delaware, and North Carolina all exceeded 30 percent, while Florida, Maryland, New Jersey, and Tennessee had increases of over 20 percent. On the other side of the ledger, North Dakota and Vermont experienced losses of more than 20 percent over the past 10 years. License holder losses in California, Iowa, and Nevada exceeded 10 percent during the last decade. Factors causing changes in license sales from year to year are not clear. However, long term trends have been shown to be related to weather (drought or floods), perceived or actual fish abundance, and population growth. Increases in license fees generally have been found to have a minor, short-term effect on license sales.

License sales figures are compiled annually by the USFWS from certified information submitted by state fish and wildlife agencies. State funding through the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration Program, administered by the USFWS, is apportioned in part by the number of paid fishing license holders in each state.



Just the other day I crawled up into the attic to dig out my ice fishing gear. What really surprised me, was that I had to make four trips to get it all down. I can remember the day when it could be carried with one hand. All I used to have was a cheap jug stick and a brown paper bag with a few hooks and some split shot. Well the times have changed. It now takes two 5 gallon pails to carry all my gear, plus a plastic sled for the bait bucket, ice auger, lantern and ice spud. Usually my son goes with, so there is more gear to drag onto the ice. Don't get me wrong, I enjoy all these toys, and the comfort with which I have when on the ice. Why do they have to be so expensive? There are so many things I still need. There isn't enough time to enjoy it all either. Why is it that the things I enjoy are so expensive and don't fit my schedule? I think I'm losing it here, it has been too long since I have been fishing. Is the ice thick enough yet?

ICE FISHING TRIP

The reservations have been made, we are going to Winnibigoshish. We will be fishing out of Nodak's Resort in Bena, which is on the south shore of the lake. The trip will be made by motor coach, leaving New Ulm at 6:00 A.M. on January 20th. We will return to New Ulm at approximately 6:00 P.M. on January 22nd. This year the fish houses are not sleepers, and since Winnie is not much for night fishing you won't miss anything by not being on the ice at night. We will by staying in modern cabins on shore. Basically it will be the same type of arrangement as other years. The cabins sleep from 5 to 7 people, and you will need to bring your own food and refreshments. Transportation will be available to take us to and from shore. This will be a new and exciting experience for us. The jumbo perch bite is supposed to be excellent again this year, with fish in the one pound or better category, according to a local expert. We have room for only 26 people, so don't wait too long to sign up for this trip. Cost for this years ice fishing expedition will be about \$105. This includes fish houses, cabins and motor coach transportation. A \$20 deposit is required to hold your spot on the trip. CLEAR LAKE UPDATE

The seasons have changed. Winter is upon us, and the lake is starting to freeze over. In fact, by the time you read this, a few brave souls will probably have ventured onto the ice for some early ice angling. Before you head out, be sure there is enough ice to safely support a person on foot. Just because the ice is thick enough in one place, doesn't always mean it is everywhere. Ice thickness can vary a great deal in even a short distance. With early ice you should be checking often as you walk out. When you do go out, be prepared. I always carry a pair of ice picks on a string, either in my coat pocket or around my neck. A length of 1 inch poly rope can come in very handy if someone should go through the ice, and 25 to 50 feet doesn't take up a lot of room. Even though Clear Lake is a fairly shallow lake, breaking through in just a couple of feet of water is no fun. It may sound like a lot of extra fooling around just to go fishing, but how much is your life worth?

It sounds like we should have some pretty good fishing this winter. According to the latest test netting done at the lake, it is loaded. Unfortunately, along with an abundance of game fish, the lake is also loaded with baitfish. Walleye and sunfish populations are way above the state average. We have a chance to experience some very good fishing this winter, but it is going to take some work. They won't be jumping out of the holes like a couple of years ago, but I believe with a little experimenting, some nice fish will be caught. Don't forget, when the thin ice signs go up this winter, it is now against the law to be inside the signs. One last thing, the big fish house is no longer white. It has received a fresh coat of paint and is now a light green.


