CLEAR LAKE UPDATE


We had a little bit of a scare at the end of February when the oxygen dropped down to 2.8. This is very close to the dangerous level for fish survival. I believe this was brought on by the heavy snow cover we had at the time and light wind conditions. Without the wind our aeration system will not supply the lake with sufficient oxygen. We got some relief with the warm weather which melted a lot of the snow and allowed sunlight to penetrate through the ice. The last report we received showed the oxygen rebounding to 5.4. Fishing has still been hit or miss. If you happen to pick the right spot on the right day, you will pick up some sunfish. Crappie fish-

ing has been a futile effort this winter. The aeration systems motor and blower, which were overhauled this past fall, has performed flawlessly. Only one thin ice sign has gone down so far an none have been damaged or destroyed. We did have vandalism occur to one of our warning signs. It seems someone got stuck coming of the lake and needed something to put under their tires for traction, so they proceeded to break the sign into pieces and then left it all lay on the ice after he got out. The sign will cost about

forty dollars to replace. The fish houses came off the lake without any problems, although we did have a little trouble getting the snow cleared away from the landing. I would like to thank the guys who showed up to help that day, especially John Vorwerk for bringing his Scout with the snow plow. Also a big thank you to Jr. Berg for allowing us to store the houses on his property.

This may seem a little silly, but I'm sure it happens to other people. It is important to make sure you are prepared before you head for the lake or river this spring. It can be very frustrating to discover the tackle box that always sat under the front seat of the boat is no longer there. Or the spare set of spark plugs you always kept in the tackle box got used last year and you forgot to buy another spare set. Little things like this can turn a beautiful day into a disaster. A little bit of preparation can make all the difference in the world. It seems I have wandered a bit here, but that seems to happen to me a lot this time of year. F.Y.I.

The Environmental Protection Agency wants to get the lead out of fishing. Reacting to a lawsuit brought by the Environmental Defense Fund, the EPA has proposed a ban on certain lead sinkers, and possibly lead jigs, which the agency says present an unreasonable risk of injury to waterfowl. There is evidence that birds such as common loons and trumpeter swans ingest sinkers, which they mistake for food or gravel for their crops.

Leak sinkers are already banned in Great Britain, and in this country leadhead jigs are illegal in Yellowstone National Park, with split shot and other lead sinkers expected to be banned there next year. A few companies here and abroad offer non-toxic sinkers for fly fishermen, including one made from a tungsten-based material that hardens when it comes in contact with water. But the jury is still out on how effective they are. Meanwhile, the EPA is looking at such substitute materials as copper, zinc, and brass, which may prove toxic as well. The fishing tackle industry, which currently produces about 2 million pounds of lead sinkers a year, is also studying lead substitutes including tin, stainless steel, and bismuth, but most are less dense and thus bigger and bulkier, and

a lot more costly. It seems obvious that more scientific research needs to be done by the EPA and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to determine if lead sinkers are indeed causing waterfowl deaths. If they are, then a substitute for lead, one that is proven to be environmentally benign, should be mandated by law.

BIG FISH

That's what anglers in Minnesota may soon be saying if experiments conducted at University of Minnesota bears fruit. Under the auspices of the University's sea Grant Program, researchers are trying to produce quick-growing fish-super specimens that will grow twice as fast as their normal counterparts. Researchers are trying to mass-produce these superfish by mixing growth genes with sperm and eggs in vats of water. During the mixing process, the extra growth genes should attach themselves to the sperm and enter the egg when it is fertilized.

Thus far, only about two in 600 fish survive the hulking process, However, researchers are predicting that the odds will soon improve, estimating that superfish production will be successful within the next two years. Meanwhile, anglers may want to start beefing up their tackle!

I am convinced that if someone indeed did "plant" these fish, that they did so knowingly. I doubt in this day and age that people were not aware of what the consequences of this act would bring about. As usual, a few ruin it for the masses. This is why it is so important to bring the people who did this before the community and have them explain their actions and pay restitution. This has to be shown that these types of actions will not be tolerated, to lessen the chances of this happening in the future. Frankly I'm pissed and you should be to!

Bring your good questions and comments to the meeting as he is always willing to listen.
