I think we have passed the critical point of the season. With a little luck and very little snow the rest of the winter, we could get through the season without starting the aeration system.



The only problem has been getting them to bite. There were a couple of reports of a few walleyes being caught in the middle of the night when things quiet down.


key it will also work on this house. This house is equipped with a propane stove, so if you plan to use it, take a tank along with you. Please remember to pick up around the houses after you have used them.

The people started showing up as early as 10:30 A.M., and they kept coming and coming. By the time they stopped, we had 340 people entered in the contest. It was a perfect afternoon, with sunshine, no wind, and temperatures in the low twenties. The fish were also cooperating for most people. We had over 80 fish registered, with many more being caught but not being weighed. There were also a couple of surprises as to the types of fish caught. The first one was a 4 lb. 1 oz. carp. I didn't know they would take a hook in the winter. The second surprise, which cane up about a half hour later, was a 2 lb. 3oz. bullhead. It may be a little bit of a shock to you, hearing that these fish were caught in Clear Lake, but they are not a serious threat to the lake. The number of carp and bullheads in the lake is very insignificant and causes no immediate threat to the gamefish population.

Rhonda Berg caught the biggest crappie, a 1 lb. 4oz. fish that caused quite a stir when it was brought in to be weighed. The biggest sunfish was a 10 oz. beauty caught by Adam Boyum. Sad to say, there were no walleyes caught again this year. I would like to thank all the members who came out to the lake early to help set things up for the contest and those who helped with the contest itself. Without your help, we could not have made this the best contest we have ever had. Thank you.

LET'S GO TO THE BEACH




