

CLEAR LAKE UPDATE

Aeration system works flawlessly



We have made it through anotherwinter without experiencing any fishkill. The aeration system was started at the end of January and will probably be shut down by the time you read this. The system worked flawlessly this year, after sitting idle last year. The oxygen never dropped below 3.5 ppm, which is well within the safe limits for fish survival. A Little About Water Quality



The pH value of water, on a scale of 0 to 14, measures the concentration of hydrogen ions. Pure distilled water is considered nuetral with a pH reading of 7. Water is basic if the pH is greater than: water with pH of less than 7 is considered acid. For every one unit change in pH there is aproximately a ten-fold change in how acidic or basic the water is. Most valuable species, such as brook trout, are sensitive to changes in pH; immature stages of aquatic insects and immature fish are extremely sensitive to low pH values. Very acidic lakes and streams cause leaching of heavy metals into the water. As an example, lemon juice has a pH value of just a little over 2, while Ammonia has a pH of 12. Pure rain water has a pH value of 5.6, while Northeastern Minnesota rain water has a pH of only 4.6. If a lake becomes too acidic, the lake becomes sterile and will not support fish and other aquatic life.



DON'T STOCK THAT BAIT

Introductions of bait fish can harm other species through competition, predation, or hybridization. The baitfish industry in the U.S. and Canada sells about \$1 billion worth of bait each year. Like other industries, it's driven by supply and demand. Demand for the bait continues. In 1991, for example, more than 800 million baitfish were harvested for sale in Minnesota alone. The bait business isn't without controversy. Problems generally fall into two categories: effects on the environment and spread of disease.

Taking bait from natural systems reduces the population of that species by removal and injury during harvest. Baitfish collections may also accidentally include species prohibited for bait use, like young game fish. Some researchers have shown that limited harvest of bait has only a temporary effect and is of little biological significance. Others have found the effects to be more significant, especially where bait harvest is intense or concentrated in one area. Use of livebait can also affect the water where fishing occurs. There livebait may escape or anglers may empty bait buckets into the water after a day's fishing, although to do so is illegal in many states. Even if dumping bait is legal where you fish, it can be harmful. No harm occurs if the bait species already is present and reproducing in the body of water. If the bait species doesn't exist there, however, it can become established. This can damage the existing fishery by altering the fish community. In some instances, anglers have intentionally stocked baitfish, perhaps intending to provide more forage for gamefish and improve the fishery. Poorly planned introductions can seriously hurt fishing. We also know that introductions of baitfish can harm other species through competition, predation, or hybridization. Fishery biologists also are concerned about the introduction of new diseases into fish populations. In an angler survey, 41% said they released unused bait alive, about one in four anglers killed live bait before discarding it. Over half the anglers didn't know that releasing livebait was illegal.
