

Don't let the "Big One" get away

Big fish test the limits of our tackle. They pull harder and know more tricks than small ones. And since most of us hook very few lunkers, we don't have the luxury of learning how to fight and land them by trial and error. But if you follow four simple principles, you can increase your odds of brings in the fish of your lifetime.

1. Whenever you go fishing, assume that this is the day you'll hook your Big One. Keep you tackle in tip-top condition. A big fish will always find and exploit any weakness in your gear. Keep your reel oiled and its drag properly set. Replace old or used line and leaders. Check your rod's guides for line-fraying nicks. Tie careful knots. Keep your hooks sharp and rust-free.

2. When playing a big fish, it's better to be too aggressive than too cautious. The longer a fish is in the water, the greater the likelihood that something will go wrong. Early in the fight, when a Big One insists on taking the line, let it run freely. Don't try to stop the fish on its first hard run. Let the drag of the reel, the flex of the rod, and the friction of the line running through the



water tire it. But when the fish pauses, don't let it rest. Take control. Exert strong down and dirty sideways pressure with your rod to turn the fish's head, making it change directions. Force the fish to do what it doesn't want to do. Pump the rod, then lower it, and reel down to regain line.

3. Stay close to your fish. If you're in a boat, chase it when it runs. If you're wading, follow it along the shoreline. The shorter the distance between you and the fish,

the better your chances of landing it.

4. When a Big One jumps, bow to it. Lower your rod and extend it toward the fish to create slack in your line. If a heavy fish falls on a taut line, it can tear the hook from its mouth or break the leader

Non of this guarantees that you'll land your Big One. But it'll give you a fighting chance, and that's as much as anybody can hope for.


