## Some fish survived winter kill

It appears that we did not get a complete fish kill at Clear Lake. Although many fiish did die, it appears some did survive. I have and one report of northerns spawning in the wetland to the northwest of the lake, awe aalso heard that the DNR has some walleyes and alot of bullheads in the test nets. The bullheads were more or less expected, the walleyes and northerns came as quite a surprise. With the numbers of other fish we saw dead along the shores of Clear Lake, I did not believe there could be any game fish that survived. Now what shall we do? The game fish did not all die and there is quite a population of bullheads. Do we want the lake treated again? This would mean a wait of possibly two years before we could start fishing again. Do we leave the lake as it is and stock some more game fish? This would mean putting up with the bullheads. But we could be fishing much sooner. These are some tough questions, and they need serious consideration before coming to any conclusion. We will have more inforamtion and a better idea of where things stand at the next meeting.

The thin ice signs were retrieved and they had a pretty rough season. Most will have to be painted and quite a few will need new signs applied. We may also have to make some this summer, as we are down to about 60 signs. Until next month, Good Fishing!

#### Heaven's Fire

If you're fishing in a lightning storm, the last cast of the day could be the last cast of your life.

Each year 40 million bolts of lightning strike the continental United States. Most of us believe that we have about as much chance of getting struck as we do of being impaled by arrows falling from the sky. But the fact is that the silver arrows of thunder's quiber injure 1,000 people annually, many of them outdoorsmen like ourselves, and kill from 150 to 250. That's more than are killed by any other natural disaster, including tornadoes, and it's more than are killed by hurricanes, floods, avalanches, blizzards, and erathquakes combined.

As the jagged leaderstroke of lightning's downward thrust nears a prominence of land, an opposaite charge is induced and a pilot stroke may rise from the land to complete the path. Multiple return strokes rising from the ground cause the ionized air to flicker dramatically, and these upward strokes are extremely hot (as much as 50,00 degrees F) and may produce up to 100 million volts of electricity, which is more than is generated by the country's largest power plant. By counting the number of seconds between seeing a bolt of lighting and hearing the peal of its thunder, you can easily guage itsa distance from you. Allow .5 seconds for each mile. But don'tbe misled into second-guessing your safty by counting seconds, because the front of the strom could alreadybe over your head. Lightning doesn't give all its victims the chance to learn by mistake. Almost a third who are hit will die. So if you are fishing, don't tell yourself that there's time for one last cast. It could be just that - your last cast.

#### tip line\_\_

- Fish have a hard time sucking in baits or lures that are fished on a tight line. Leaving a slight bit of slack in the line makes it easier for a fish to take the bait all the way into its mouth. Pumping your rod while trolling or retrieving creates moments when your line alternates between being slack and tight and makes it easier for a fish to grab hold.
- Tents and sleeping bags will last indefinitely if you dry them thoroughly after use, before putting them away. Rig up a pulley and rope in the eaves of your garage and use it to hang tents and sleeping bags up out of the way until they are completely dry before folding them for storage.
