## New Club Jackets Arrive


The new Club Jackets have arrived and do they look good. Anyone who ordered one can pick it up at the next meeting or give Mike a call.

## Mercury: a Little Goes a Very Long Way

eat! This silvery stuff just rolls off my hands and I can rub it on an old penny to make it shiny as a new dime.

A flashback to high school chemistry class 40 years ago, when Mr Elder introduced us to the unique properties of mercury.

Today, it's unlikely that any student will have that chance to play with mercury, now that we know how dangerous this metal can be.

Mercury is a major concern because it poses a health threat. Like water, mercury evaporates very easily. When we inhale the vapor, it goes into the bloodstream. In large doses, this causes mercury poisoning, which affects the nervous system.

The toxicity and persistence of this silvery metals affects the nervous system.

And mercury contamination isn't a possibility remote from the average Minnesotan's every-day life. Mercury-containing devices, such as thermometers, barometers, thermostats,

"silent" light switches, flourescent lamps and blood-pressure gauges, are common in homes. Under some conditions, breaking these divices can result in very high exposure to mercury vapor.

#### Mercury accumulates in aquatic species

Mercury vapor can lend up in an organic compound, merthylmercury, a major contaminant of Minnesota fish. Mercury in emissions from coal-fired power plants and vapors from other sources can be carried long distances in the air before it falls to Earth. Bacteria convert some of the mercury that falls on wetlands, lakes and rivers to methylmercury. The methylmercury builds up in zooplankton (flea-size animals) because their bodies accumulate the methylmercury faster than they can rid themselves of it (it "bioaccumulates"). The zooplankton, in turn, are eaten by other aquatic animals. At each level of the food chain, the concentration of methylmercury at least trebles. Any animal--wildlife or humanthat eats fish at the top of the food chain may get a big dose.

If a pregnant woman eats a lot of methhylmercury-contaminated fish, her fetus may be damaged. A National Search Council committee recently estimated that about 60,000 children may be born in the nation each year with neurological problems that could lead to poor school performance because of exposure to methylmercury in the womb.

Infants and children can also be at high risk from contaminated fish and possibly breast milk.

Since the flesh of large, predatory fish such as walleye and pike, is likely to contain high levels of methylmercury, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, has issued fish-consumption advisories for many lakes.
