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### From the President. . .

I don't know about you, but I'm definitely ready to do some spring fishing. My summer tackle box looks like a twister went through it from last fall, so I have some sorting out to do. I think this might be the year I get some of that old stuff I never use anymore out of my box and into a second backup box so I can find something when I'm digging around. I'm also putting new line on all my reels. I do that every year just in case I do happen to hook that real big one, you know the one with the thick glasses on about to die of old age.

Over the past three years I have had the privilege of attending one of the most interesting and important events put on regarding this state's surface water. It is called the Minnesota Shallow Lakes Conference. This two day event was held this year at the Willmar Holiday Inn Convention Center. Experts and professionals working with water from across the state have converged each of the last 3 years to share information and strategies on how shallow lake management techniques can be applied to improve our ever declining water quality in them. At times I have to say it was quite discouraging and depressing, but I remain a "glass half full" guy. I was a panelist and a presenter at this year's event and as such we were given thought provoking questions to respond to. One of the questions we were asked to discuss went something like this: If best management practices on land are in place or not feasible for numerous reasons are serious interventions such as drawdowns, wholesale fisheries manipulations, alum applications our only option for improvement or maintenance? Having seen the drastic improvements first hand that these serious interventions can have, my comments were, yes it is doable with a definite caveat. If we rely on only this approach we will surly fail within a period of 2 to 4 years if watershed best management practices are not implemented on the land. In the case where they are not feasible or being adhered to for whatever reason, we need to develop either policy that forces it, or new runoff management approaches that property owners will readily adopt that have not been developed or that we are simply not aware of. Believe me; the technology to meter water within our tile drainage systems is out there. It's fairly new but I have seen presentations on it numerous times. My question is why it is not being installed everywhere it is practical. One answer is always the same, money. Where is the incentive to do the practice? One incentive that has been show over and over is that this literally raises the sub-surface water table up to where emerging row crops root systems can access the water to grow faster. It also allows the crop producer to do the metering with a devise that is easy to manipulate. You would think during low precipitation years this would also be a plus to have that aquifer higher when you need it. But alas the unit is not being installed at a wholesale scale and we are back to who's going to pay and even then, if I don't have to do it why should I, things are fine for me as they are.

Another real good presentation at this year's conference was given by Chris Niskanen, outdoor columnist for the St. Paul Pioneer Press. He talked a great deal about the issue of dedicated funding for natural resources and the legislative initiative

to put it on this year's election ballot for consideration as a 3/8ths of a cent hike in the state sales tax to raise money for clean water. We have all seen the headlines in the papers regarding what is chosen to lead or dominate the so-called news. Let's see, gay


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
