## NUASF E.E. Mecklenurg Environmental Scholarship awarded to four recipients for the year 2006

By Ruth and Dave Mecklenburg This is the seventh year that the New Ulm Area Sport Fishermen (NUASF) EE. Mecklenburg Environmental Scholarship has given out scholarships to area students interested in a career in the environmental field.

As most members know, Earl Mecklenburg was the father of one of our longtime members, Dave Mecklenburg. Dave's dad grew up on a farm in Milford Township and moved to New Ulm as an adult. In addition to his family and many friends, education and the environment were very important to him. After Earl died in 1998, his family decided to create a scholarship to honor his memory. So Dave asked the NUASF club if we would like to co-sponsor the program. Since our club is involved in many activities supporting environmental causes, we welcomed the opportunity.

Every year the Mecklenburg family makes a sizable donation and our club has voted to match that donation. In addition, individual club members have generously chosen to donate \$5 when renewing their memberships. The scholarship fund has grown to the point that last year we gave out two \$500 scholarships and two \$250 scholarships and this year we were able to do the same.

Matthew Baier, the son of Randy and

Amy Baier, was awarded \$500. He is a graduate of Springfield High School and plans to attend South Dakota State University in the fall, majoring in Wildlife Conservation and

All you need to put your river walleye heads in a plastic bag and in the freezer and then contact the DNR or get them to one of the distribution points.
