Thanks to the renewable fuel standard included in the 2005 Energy Bill, our region has seen unprecedented private investment in ethanol refineries. As the Monitor reported last month, more than 40 new ethanol corn plants are being constructed across the nation to take advantage of the 7.5 billion gallon mandate included in the Energy Bill, and experts estimate that another 60 plants are under different stages of planning or approved for construction. But, as the Monitor also reported last month, the explosion of ethanol production could pose new environmental challenges as our region's farmers plant more and more corn to meet soaring demand.

Fortunately, renewal of the Farm Bill creates a new chance to invest in renewable energy - and to make energy investments that also help the Mississippi. In particular, renewal of the Farm Bill - and renewable of energy programs authorized by the Farm Bill - provides a chance to prime the pump for fuels made from crop wastes, grasses and other alternative feed stocks that require less fertilizer and causes less soil erosion.

To make sure we're investing in sources of energy that also meet the needs of farmers and consumers, the next Farm Bill could begin to explicitly link our federal renewable energy investments to environmental goals. For example, Congress could direct USDA to subject energy grant and loan proposals to some sort of environmental index to encourage the development of energy alternatives that provide significant environmental gains such as clean water. Congress could also expand working lands stewardship programs to ensure that that feed stocks -- whether corn, cane or cellulose -- are all grown with appropriate environmental safeguards.

As America makes the transition from a hydrocarbon economy to a carbohydrate economy, policymakers should boost energy solutions that provide environmental solutions as well.

The next farm Bill is a good place to start!
